Fuel Poverty	Our Home Improvement policy is in place to assist home owners to repair, improve or adapt their properties. In the capital programme £550,000 on average has been made available each year and resources are targeted at low income households living in the worst properties with a specific criteria relating to energy efficiency improvements. Those on means tested benefits are 'passported' to have no contribution to the cost of works (subject to grant limits and eligibility). The policy has a further strand to complement renewable technology incentives, by providing an interest free loan of up to £3,000.	
	In addition to the Councils own grant programme we worked with Action Surrey to deliver the Streets Ahead solid wall insulation programme (a Green Deal Communities pilot). This programme aimed to deliver energy saving measures (solid wall insulation was the main driver) across the county. In Guildford 55 homes have been insulated under this scheme, at a cost of £22,000 achieving a carbon saving of 45 tonnes.

Council Tax Mail Out	In 2016 the Council in partnership with Action Surrey designed and produced an energy saving information and awareness leaflet, which was included in the council tax mail out to all 56,000 homes in the borough. This helped make local residents aware of: - Warm Home Discount Scheme - Priority Service register - Watersure scheme - Aerial heat loss survey (residents can view how much heat is being lost from their home) - local home improvement grants, - the renewable energy interest free loan, - as well as Action Surrey our local energy advice service
Partnerships for delivering support to low income and vulnerable households.	Advice in GP Surgeries: In February 2015 a pilot scheme offering people free advice services at a number of local Guildford GP surgeries was launched. Advisors from Citizens Advice Bureau, Guildford have been offering their services at four Guildford GP surgeries. The pilot scheme has been seen by more than 226 clients with 427 appointments, proving its viability. The scheme has improved access to people seeking advice (98% said it was easy to access); it has been an effective response to un-met needs (60% hadn't been to Citizens Advice before); and at least 55% of clients are from Guildford's most deprived areas where social determinants of health can impact. Most clients were referred to the service by their GP practice staff or had picked up a leaflet at the surgery. 39% were disabled or had long-term health problems – the others would have had health problems as they were at their GP surgery. Many of the clients who returned a survey said they had been stressed or upset and had felt better after having had advice. There were high levels of satisfaction among surgery staff and it is valued by GPs. All clients said they would be likely to recommend it to friends and family. This project is trying to secure further funding to be able to continue to offer advice at GP surgeries.
Streets Ahead	We have worked with Action Surrey to deliver the Streets Ahead solid wall insulation programme. This utilised information from the BRE database to target areas with solid wall properties. This programme aimed to deliver energy saving measures across the county, principally for solid wall insulation. In Guildford 55 homes have been insulated at a cost of £22,000 achieving a carbon saving of 45 tonnes.
	Building on this project, we plan to carry out a boiler replacement project in 2017, targeting fuel poor households.

Social Housing	The Council own 5246 homes, about 95% of which are double-glazed. The remaining 5% of homes will have double-glazing installed as part of our current capital programme (2017/18). Once this is complete, all properties will be double-glazed with maybe some minor individual exceptions. The Council continues to replace old, inefficient boilers in their housing stock. During 2015-2017 the council installed around 440 'A' rated condensing boilers. The Council continues to improve the thermal efficiency of their social housing, since 2015 we have retrofitted 49 homes with external solid wall insulation. Since 2015 the Council has built 62 homes to code for sustainable homes level 4 standard at Lakeside Close in Ash and New Road in Gomshall. The majority of these homes have integrated solar photovoltaic (electricity) panels in the roofs of the homes. We are planning on building more council homes and will investigate the feasibility of renewable and low carbon technologies in all high density new build schemes.
Renewable Energy Mapping	The council carried out a Renewable Energy Mapping study. This identifies the best renewable energy opportunities within the borough taking into account constraints that exist. It informs our investigations for renewable energy opportunities.
Thermal imaging camera loan scheme	The Council has run free thermal imaging camera training sessions and set up a loan scheme for local residents and community groups. Over 300 local residents have benefitted from the thermal imaging camera loan scheme.
Thermal imaging survey	The Council commissioned a thermal imaging survey of the borough in 2015. The thermal imaging data is available to public on the council's website: https://www.guildford.gov.uk/energysavingadvice
	Residents can compare the efficiency of their property with that of neighbours and find out what they can do to improve the energy efficiency of their home.
	The data provides an indication of the relative thermal performance and efficiency of properties in the borough.
Community events	The Council regularly attends community events across the borough (roadshows, farmers markets and village fetes) to help raise awareness of energy saving at home and provide advice and information.
Warmth Matters Surrey Community Action	Warmth Matters is run by the charity Surrey Community Action, offering free advice and practical, hands-on support to people across Surrey who are affected by, or at risk of fuel poverty. Many people run in to hardship over the winter but may find it difficult to ask for advice or know where to go for impartial information. Warmth Matters aims to bridge that gap by visiting communities at most need, prioritising young families and those with disabilities or chronic illnesses. This scheme commenced in September 2016, to date 157 families have received information and advice to spend less on energy bills and keep their homes warm and healthy in Guildford borough. Their sessions help people to better understand their fuel bills and equip them with the skills to find the best deals.

The partnership brings together officers from across the Local Authorities of Surrey together with Action Surrey to facilitate joint working to address climate change issues. The group has a particular focus on domestic energy efficiency, decentralised generation from renewable resources and opportunities for joined-up action on our own estates. Further details on this Surrey wide partnership are detailed in this report. Guildford Borough Council in partnership with Surrey County Council and Action Surrey are working, to develop a Statement of Intent in order to put forward declarations to energy suppliers for ECO Flexible Eligibility funding for residents in fuel poverty.		
Association of Local Energy Officers South East (ALEO SE)	The Council links into the ALEO SE to share knowledge on reducing domestic-sector carbon footprint and tackling fuel poverty across the region.		
Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB)	The Council works with and helps to fund the local CABs (Ash and Guildford) to help provide free, independent, confidential and impartial advice on managing fuel bills to local residents.		
Parity Trust	The Council works with the Parity Trust who has designed the Home Trust Loan for home owners who require financial assistance in order to carry out essential works to their properties, which can include energy efficiency or renewable technology installations.		
Public Health Team Health and Wellbeing Board	The Council works with the Health and Wellbeing Board and Surrey County Council Public Health Team on health and wellbeing, including the health impacts of housing (which links to energy issues).		
Seasonal Health Group	We will be working with these partners through the seasonal health group and the housing study group to ensure that housing issues are considered as part of the wider public health agenda.

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FUEL POVERTY / PUBLIC HEALTH

Under the new definition of fuel poverty, Low Income High Cost, a household is considered to be fuel poor where:

- they have required fuel costs that are above average (the national median level)
- were they to spend that amount, they would be left with a residual income below the official poverty line.

7.2% (35,005) of Surrey households are considered to be in fuel poverty (BRE Housing Stock Appraisal for Surrey 2014).

We aim to support Surrey's Health & Well Being Strategy and wider local strategic priorities, on issues such as housing, health and poverty, through housing strategies/corporate plans. From 2015, Action Surrey has supported the new Fuel Poverty Strategy for England, which sets an ambition that as many fuel poor homes as reasonably practicable achieve a B and C energy efficiency standard by 2030.

We aim to provide access to affordable warmth through local initiatives which will contribute to reducing levels of fuel poverty in the borough/district. Since 2015 Action Surrey has utilised opportunities presented by the NICE Excess Winter Deaths and Illnesses Guidelines and Cold Weather Plan.

Action Surrey are also currently in discussions with all partner districts and boroughs, including Guildford Borough Council, to develop a Statement of Intent for Surrey County in order to put forward declarations to energy suppliers for ECO Flexible Eligibility funding for residents in fuel poverty.

MEASURES WE ARE TAKING TO RESULT IN SIGNIFICANT ENERGY EFFICIENCY IMPROVEMENTS OF OUR RESIDENTIAL ACCOMMODATION

GREEN DEAL/ECO

Action Surrey and Guildford Borough Council will continue to take advantage of any government initiatives appearing through ECO and Green Deal for energy efficient measures and tackling fuel poverty.

The following measures have been installed to reduce carbon emission and fuel poverty during the period 1 Jan 2015 – 31 Dec 2016:

1 Jan 2015 – 31 Dec 2016

A consortium representing all Surrey local authorities has received funding through DECC's Green Deal Communities Fund to roll out a street by street solid wall insulation project, under the banner of 'Streets Ahead'. This project, which was delivered by Action Surrey, offered a grant to fit internal or external wall insulation and promote take up of Green Deal funding. The project was one of the most successful GDC schemes, with 464 properties insulated across the county upon its closure in September 2016. Part of the funding for this also contributed to the Low Carbon Communities (LCC) project, which has provided energy audits, community engagement and grants towards installing energy efficiency measures for community groups/buildings across the county. The Department of Health also awarded funding to the Surrey Healthy Homes Partnership to support local authorities to reduce the levels of deaths and illness that are due to vulnerable people living in cold housing. Action Surrey has successfully delivered two Healthy Homes projects in two different Clinical Commissioning Groups within the county, aimed at identifying where energy efficiency measures could be an effective intervention to reduce the risks of illness as a result of a cold home.
