## FISH holiday playscheme 2019





#### Our children

The age range of children for the FISH holiday playscheme is 10-16 years. The aims and objectives of the scheme establish a clear focus on supporting those families that are most vulnerable and in need of support to access services for the benefit of their child's well-being. However, the mix of children attending the scheme from varying schools, communities, abilities, cultural and economic backgrounds both within and outside of the borough is highly valued. It is this mix of children that enriches the play scheme environment - the learning, play experiences, and opportunities available to those attending. It is what makes FISH quite unique as a local authority playscheme, particularly for one targeted at this age group.

The scheme recognises the importance of free play for young people and providing them with space and time to relax, socialise and play, away from the pressures of home and school life.

#### **Removing barriers**

FISH strives to overcome barriers that children face in accessing play opportunities such as parental anxiety of perceived and real dangers, lack of transport, traffic, lack of funds, outcome focused play provisions or reduction in their free time.

#### Inclusion

FISH is committed to being an inclusive scheme, offering concessionary rates for families on benefits, experienced staff to support young people with additional needs and a subsidised transport scheme. The scheme offers young people a mainstream setting where they are able to freely access play and leisure and make choices for themselves in a supportive environment. This is recognised in parent feedback as being a significant step forward for many young people who usually attend specialist provision.

#### Strategic planning

The FISH business review sets out the objectives of delivering the FISH playscheme and focuses provision of future resources to ensure it continues to meet the needs of the community. It assesses the outcomes achieved so far and commits to the continued measuring of the service provided. The business review ensures the scheme supports the Play Strategy 2016-2021, which is aligned to the Council's key strategic priorities.







FISH prides itself on providing a relaxed, fun, and open play space where young people can naturally flourish, learn and develop, whilst participating in play, sport and art for fun.

#### Who we help?

- 600 places a year for all 10 to 16 year olds across Guildford
- families facing financial or transport barriers
- children with additional needs who benefit from accessing a mainstream setting

#### How we do this?

- one to one places provided for young people with additional needs
- subsidised transport scheme for up to 7 locations across the borough
- concessionary rates from £32 per week for families in receipt of benefits
- wide variety of specialist onsite and offsite activities
- choice of standard or extended day
- stimulating, self-accessing environment where children can move freely and choose which activities, they wish to engage with

#### The difference this made in 2019

- 60% of children said they would be at home or playing online if they were not at FISH
- 75% of parents felt their child had improved their personal development whilst at FISH
- 45 children were referred and funded by external organisations including; the Army Training Centre (ATC) Pirbright, Home School Link Workers, Guildford Family Support Team and Children's Services

#### What difference this makes

'Having a buddy on hand makes such a big difference to my son, and also for my peace of mind. I know my son is in safe hands, and he will be learning from his buddy how to deal with emotions and situations when they arise.'

### Partnerships and funding

The value of partnership working is recognised as being key to the successful delivery of FISH. This year, we are proud to have worked with; ATC Pirbright, Guildford's Family Support Team and Home School Link Workers, who referred vulnerable young people to the scheme. A local charity, Poyle, has been a long-standing partner. It offers young people the chance to attend the playscheme, when reffered by Guildford's Family Support Team and local Home School Link Workers through the Guildford School's Confederation. This funding is highly valued by families and we are grateful for their continued support.

Synergy Dance, University of Surrey, CYP Haven and Surrey Police, all delivered high quality, fully-funded, workshops and activities that enabled us to increase the range of activities the young people can engage in.



We are thankful to the High Sheriff of Surrey for awarding us with a High Sheriff Youth Awards community grant. With this money, we were able to offer an additional five keyworker places for young people with additional needs, allowing us to acheive ten places each week with a one to one keyworker. We were delighted to show Mrs Bridget Biddel, the current High Sherif of Surrey, around the scheme to see all the young people having fun.

### Achievements

FISH was proud to have been nominated for 'Active Community Project of the Year 2019' at the Sport Guildford Awards 2019. This award recognies schemes and services that promote physical activity in children. FISH was reffered to as an 'exceptional scheme'. Guildford Olympian, Liam Heath, presented the awards.
